PART II: Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions

Narrative report of Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions:

David Stevenson is currently an Assistant Professor of Health Policy in the Department of Health Care Policy at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Stevenson's primary research interests are aging, health policy, and long-term care. His recent work has focused on the intersection of long-term care and hospice, the impact of Medicare Part D on the nursing home sector, the link between ownership and nursing home performance, long-term care financing options for the future, pay-for-performance in the nursing home sector, and the role of regulation in ensuring quality of care. He has previously studied the consumer's role in nursing home quality, including public reporting, consumer complaints, and malpractice litigation. He has conducted health policy and health services research in various settings, including the U.S. Public Health Service, the University of Washington School of Public Health, the Urban Institute, the Visiting Nurse Service of New York, and Medstat. This previous work focused on state long-term care policy reforms, access to health care for people with disabilities, and the use of cost-effectiveness research in setting policy priorities. Dr. Stevenson received a B.A. in religion from Oberlin College in 1991, a S.M. in health policy and management from the Harvard School of Public Health in 1997, and a Ph.D. in Health Policy from Harvard University in 2004.
